How did the early American South change over the course of the 17th and 18th century? How can we

understand the legacies of the these first Southern peoples?

Course Description:

This independent study is focused on preparing the student to write a research paper on the Dimery and Chicori peoples. Over the course of the semester we will read historical and archaeological monographs that investigate the pre-colonial and colonial era Southeast. This course aims to put investigations of the Dimery and Chicori communities and research on Cheraw & Catawba coalescence in conversation with the broader dynamics of the Mississippian and Colonial southeast for a deeper understanding of early events in the Carolina Piedmont and beyond. The ultimate goal of this project is to produce an original research paper of 20 - 25 pages, and that will be grounded in primary sources.
